

The permanent secretary of the Académie Française and a historian specializing in Russian history. She was a recipient of Lomonosov Gold Medal in 2008.

She is a graduate of the elite Institut d'Études Politiques de Paris (Sciences Po). Doctorates in history, letters and human sciences (Paris, Sorbonne). Vice-Chairman of the French Diplomatic Archives Commission. Author of eighteen works, translated into twenty languages. Knight

of the Legion of Honour. Officer of Arts and Letters.

She was elected to seat 14 of the Académie Française in 1990, and her academician's sword was made by the sculptor Goudji. She became permanent secretary on 21 October 1999.

In her book *L'Empire éclaté* published in 1978 she predicted dissolution of Soviet Union.

She was awarded Grand Cross with Star of the Order of Merit of the Republic of Poland.

INTERNATIONAL VISEGRAD FUND: WHEN FOUR ARE ONE

The meeting aim is to present the International Visegrad Found grants and scholarship offer.

The International Visegrad Fund is an international organization based in Bratislava founded by the governments of the Visegrad Group (V4) countries – the Czech Republic, the Republic of Hungary, the Republic of Poland, and the Slovak Republic – in Štiřín, Czech Republic, on June 9, 2000.

The purpose of the Fund is to facilitate and promote the development of closer cooperation among V4 countries (and of V4 countries with other countries, especially but not exclusively non-EU member states in Eastern Europe, the Western Balkans and the South Caucasus) through grant support of common cultural, scientific and educational projects, youth exchanges, cross-border projects and tourism promotion, and through individual mobility programs (scholarships, residencies).

The budget of the Fund (€7 million as of 2012) consists of equal contributions of the Visegrad Group's governments. The Fund runs four grant programs (Small Grants, Standard Grants, the Visegrad Strategic Program and the Visegrad+ program), several scholarship schemes, a triple artist-in-residence program and a curriculum-building program for universities.




Jan Malicki, director of the Centre for East European Studies, University of Warsaw. The mainstream of his academic and professional interests is the history of sovietology research, process of transformation in Eastern Europe, its origin and historical background and the peculiar nationality problems in the region. He is a member of the 1st underground and subsequent editorial of the magazine "Camp" ("Obóz"); founder and head of the underground Institute of Eastern Europe, founder and the editor in chief of the quarterly "East Review" ("Przegląd Wschodni"); co-founder and the editor of the international series "Eastern Europe Bibliography: Poland – Lithuania – Belarus – Ukraine - Russia", author and the director of the program "Eastern Studies", that are held at the Centre for East European Studies.

PARTICIPANTS:

Richard Pipes is an American academician, born in Poland, who specializes in Russian history, particularly with respect to the Soviet Union. In 1976 he headed Team B, a team of analysts organized by the Central Intelligence Agency who analyzed the strategic capacities and goals of the Soviet military and political leadership. He taught at Harvard University from 1958 until his

retirement in 1996. He was the director of Harvard's Russian Research Center from 1968 to 1973 and is now Baird Professor Emeritus of History at Harvard University. In 1962 he delivered a series of lectures on Russian intellectual history at Leningrad University. He acted as senior consultant at the Stanford Research Institute from 1973 to 1978. During the 1970s, he was an advisor to Washington Senator Henry M. Jackson. In 1981 and 1982 he served as a member of the National Security Council, holding the post of Director of East European and Soviet Affairs under President Ronald Reagan. Richard Pipes was a member of the Committee on the Present Danger from 1977 until 1992 and belongs to the Council of Foreign Relations. In the 1970s, he was a leading critic of détente, which he described as "inspired by intellectual indolence and based on ignorance of one's antagonist and therefore inherently inept"





Hélène Carrère d'Encausse is the permanent secretary of the Académie Française and a historian specializing in Russian history. She was a recipient of Lomonosov Gold Medal in 2008. She is a graduate of the elite Institut d'Études Politiques de Paris (Sciences Po). She was elected to seat 14 of the Académie Française in 1990, and her academician's sword was made by the sculptor Goudji. She became permanent secretary on 21 October 1999. In her book *L'Empire éclaté* published in 1978 she predicted dissolution of Soviet Union. She was awarded Grand Cross with Star of the Order of Merit of the Republic of Poland

Stanislau Shushkievich, Belarusian politician and scientist. Before his political career he was a prominent scientist (physics and mathematics). From September 28 1991 till January 26 1994 he was the first leader and Head of State of independent Belarus after the dissolution of the Soviet Union (Chairman of the

Supreme Soviet – also chairman of the Parliament). He supported free market and democratic reforms. On December 8, 1991 in Belavezhskaya Pushcha together with the leaders of Russia – Boris Yeltsin and Ukraine – Leonid Kravchuk he signed a declaration of the dissolution of the Soviet Union and the creation of the Commonwealth of Independent States. He continues to be active in politics, heading the Belarusian Social Democratic Assembly "Hramada" party.

Alexander Rondeli, Georgian diplomat, scientist, expert on geopolitics. Holds a Ph.D. in Geography. Head of the International Relations Department at the Tbilisi State University (1991-96). He served as a Director of the Foreign Policy Research and Analysis Center at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Georgia (1997-2001). He was a research fellow and visiting professor among others, at London School of Economics and Political Science, Woodrow Wilson School and Princeton University. He holds a diplomatic rank of an Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary. Presently Dr Rondeli is a President of the Georgian Foundation For Strategic and International Studies (GFSIS), Tbilisi.

Asim Mollazade, Azeri politician and expert Doctor of Medicine. He worked for the Presidential Administration and as a Special Presidential Envoy on talks with Armenia over the war conflict (1992-93). Since 1994 he is a deputy chairman of the Popular Front Party of Azerbaijan on international affairs and a co-founder and a vice-president of the Democracy Development Foundation. Since 1998 he is a founder and a president of the Euro-Atlantic Centre of Azerbaijan. Since 2000 he is a MP to the Azerbaijani Parliament and a member of the International Affairs Commission. Since 2001 – delegate to the Council of Europe's Parliamentary Assembly (PACE). Presently Dr Mollazade is a Chairman of the Democratic Reforms Party.

The main inspiration for the journal were titles such as "Promethee" and later "La Revue de Promethee", published in Paris in the period 1926-1940 and supported by the Polish government. Although the pre-war Prometheism is, for obvious reasons, not actual in its original sense as an ideology and political practice, but may still constitute a model for the development of research and popularization of the knowledge about Eastern Europe, Central Asia and Black Sea. "New Prometheus" may also serve as a platform for dialogue between scientists and experts from countries of the region.



History of Arab Literature (pre-Islamic and early Islam periods). Member of the Turkish Armenian Reconciliation Commission (TARC). Author of over 110 scientific articles and three monographs on Arabic and Islamic Studies as well as issues concerning Philosophy, Methodology, Political Science and International Relations.

Roman Bäcker, Polish professor, head of Theory of Politics Institute at the Department of Political Science and International Studies, since September 1, 2009 dean of this faculty at the Nicholas Copernicus University in Torun. The head (since 2012) of the Committee of Political Science. The chief executive of Athenaeum. Polskie Studia Politologiczne, the member of committes of the magazines: Sprawy Wschodnie, The International Affairs Review and Bulletin of Geography. Socio-economic Series. His research work deals with theory and political sociology, the phenomena of totalitarianism, the Polish political system transformation, today's Russian political thinking, the problems of the State in the Polish socialist thought of the interwar period.

Krzysztof Gawlikowski, an organizer and the head of the Center of East Asian Studies, Institute of Political Studies, Polish Academy of Sciences (PAS). Professor of the Institute of Sociology, Warsaw University (the courses on contemporary East and Southeast Asia) and in the College of Advanced Psychology (on East Asian Civilization). The editor-inchief of the annual *Asia-Pacific: Society - Politics - Economy*, the only Polish journal on contemporary East Asia. He was elected the president of the Asia-Pacific Society and the chairman of the Polish Asia-Pacific Council. Serves as an expert to the Polish authorities. The main fields of studies: classical Chinese strategic thought, in particular the famous Sunzi's treatise *The Art of War (Sunzi bingfa)* and the Chinese martial culture (the most interesting studies published in Chinese and extensively quoted in the mainland and Taiwanese publications); East Asian social and political traditions and their impact on the modern transformations. Some studies on Vietnam and Burma.

Mykola Ryabchuk is a cultural critic, editor, poet, and author of fiction, senior research fellow at the Ukrainian Centre for Cultural Studies and the Ukrainian intellectual journal - Krytyka, which is often compared to The New York Review of Books. He is a member of the Ukrainian PEN-club, has lectured widely throughout Europe and the U.S., and is the winner of many awards, including the "The Book of the Year" award (Kyiv) for Vid Malorosii do Ukrainy (From Little Russia to Ukraine: Paradoxes of the Delayed Nation-Building. Kyiv, 2000), the Antonovych Prize in 2003 for outstanding achievements in the humanities and a Polish-Ukrainian Capitula Award in 2002 for his contribution to Polish-Ukrainian reconciliation. In 2011 he received a fellowship from the National Endowment for Democracy in Washington, D.C. Published several books concerning civil society, state and nation building, national identity, nationalism and post-communism transitions in Ukraine.

RICHARD PIPES



Richard Pipes is an American academician, born in Poland who specializes in Russian history, particularly with respect to the Soviet Union. In 1976 he headed Team B, a team of analysts organized by the Central Intelligence Agency who analyzed the strategic capacities and goals of the Soviet military and political leadership. He taught at Harvard University from 1958 until his retirement in 1996. He was the director of Harvard's Russian Research Center from 1968 to 1973 and is now Baird Professor Emeritus of History at Harvard University. In 1962 he delivered a series of lectures on Russian intellectual history

at Leningrad University. He acted as senior consultant at the Stanford Research Institute from 1973 to 1978. During the 1970s, he was an advisor to Washington Senator Henry M. Jackson. In 1981 and 1982 he served as a member of the National Security Council, holding the post of Director of East European and Soviet Affairs under President Ronald Reagan. Richard Pipes was a member of the Committee on the Present Danger from 1977 until 1992 and belongs to the Council of Foreign Relations. In the 1970s, he was a leading critic of détente, which he described as "inspired by intellectual indolence and based on ignorance of one's antagonist and therefore inherently inept"
