It's my great pleasure and privilege to welcome all and each of you in this beautiful time of a year at the University of Warsaw.

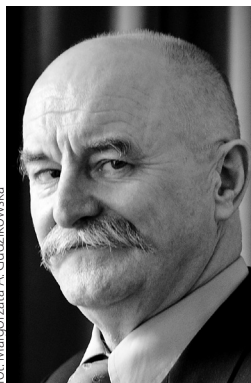
Thank you for coming to this Annual Session entitled "Triumphs and Failures".

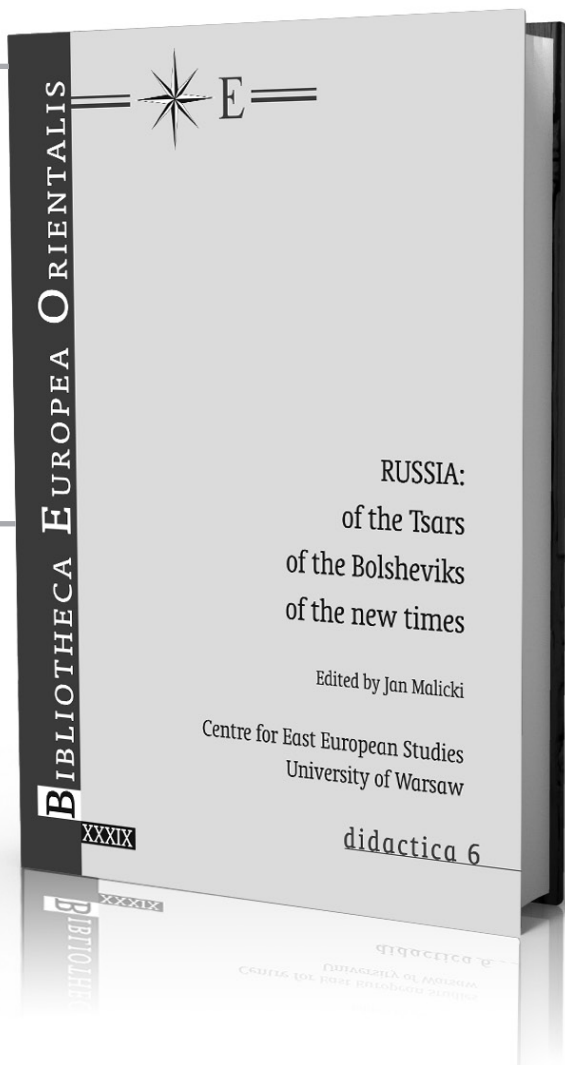

Leszek Balcerowicz

Polish economist, the former chairman of the National Bank of Poland and Deputy Prime Minister in Tadeusz Mazowiecki's government. He is famous for implementing the Polish economic transformation program in the 1990s, a shock therapy commonly referred to as the Balcerowicz Plan.

He is a professor at the world's first university institute of postgraduate studies and training in European affairs, College of Europe.

Leszek Balcerowicz is the architect of Poland's economic reforms initiated in 1989 - He designed and executed the radical stabilization and transformation of Polish economy since the fall of communism in Poland. In September 1989 Leszek Balcerowicz became Deputy Prime Minister of Poland and Minister of Finance in the first non-communist government in Poland after the Second World War. He was also President

of the Economic Committee of the Council of Ministers. He retained his positions in the government until December 1991. From April 1995 to December 2000 he was the president of the Freedom Union, a free market -oriented party and from 1997 to June 2000 he was Deputy Prime Minister, Minister of Finance and President of the Economic Committee of the Council of Ministers. In 2001-2007 he was the governor of the Central Bank of Poland.

In 1992 - 2000 he was a Chairman of the Advisory Council of the Center for Social and Economic Research (CASE) based in Warsaw. In 2006 Leszek Balcerowicz became a member of the Group of Trustees, Institute of International Finance. He is a member of the Executive Committee of the International Atlantic Economic Society (IAES), a member of the

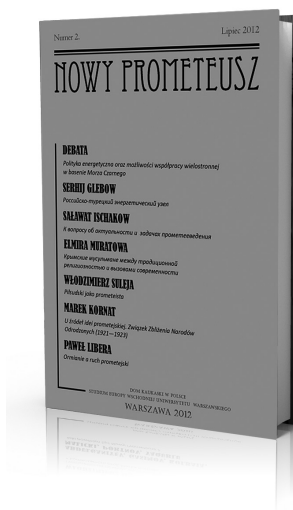
Washington - based financial advisory body, the Group of Thirty, a board member of Washington, D.C. think - tank the Peterson Institute for International Economics, and a board member of Bruegel – Brussels - based think tank. Leszek Balcerowicz is a Chairman

and a founder of Civil Development Forum Foundation - FOR based in Warsaw. In 2011 he has been appointed a member of the Advisory Scientific Committee providing advice and assistance on issues relevant to the work of the European parliament.

"New Prometheus" is a specialized journal, concerning political, cultural, economic and religious relations in the Eastern Europe, Central Asia and Black Sea regions. The main inspiration for the journal were titles such as "Promethee" and later "La Revue de Promethee", published in Paris in the period 1926-1940 and supported by the Polish government. Although the pre-war Prometheism is, for obvious reasons, not actual in its original sense as an ideology and political practice, but may still constitute a model for the development of research and popularization of the knowledge about Eastern Europe, Central Asia and Black Sea. "New Prometheus" may also serve as a platform for dialogue between scientists and experts from countries of the region.

WAS THE SOVIET UNION DOOMED TO DECAY?

Participants:

Leonid Kravchuk - is a former Ukrainian politician and the first President of Ukraine, who served from December 5, 1991, until his resignation on July 19, 1994. He is also a former Chairman of the Verkhovna Rada and People's Deputy of Ukraine serving in the Social Democratic Party of Ukraine (united) faction. After a political crisis involving the President and the Prime Minister, Kravchuk resigned from the Presidency, but ran for a second term as President in 1994. He was defeated by his former Prime Minister, Leonid Kuchma, who served as President for two terms. After Kravchuk's presidency, he was active in Ukrainian politics, serving as a People's Deputy of Ukraine in the Verkhovna Rada and the leader of Social Democratic Party of Ukraine (united)'s parliamentary group (from 2002 to 2006). He is currently politically inactive.

Stanislau Shushkievich, Belarusian politician and scientist. Before his political career he was a prominent scientist (physics and mathematics). From September 28 1991 till January 26 1994 he was the first leader and Head of State of independent Belarus after the dissolution of the Soviet Union (Chairman of the Supreme Soviet – also chairman of the Parliament). He supported free market and democratic re-

forms. On December 8, 1991 in Belavezhs-kaya Pushcha together with the leaders of Russia – Boris Yeltsin and Ukraine – Leonid Kravchuk he signed a declaration of the dissolution of the Soviet Union and the creation of the Commonwealth of Independent States. He continues to be active in politics, heading the Belarusian Social Democratic Assembly "Hramada" party.

Rudolf Pikhaja Russian professor, historian, archivist, the former director of the State Archive of the Russian Federation. 14 October 1992 year as a special envoy of the President of Russia Boris Yeltsin handed the President of Poland Lech Walesa copies of documents relating to the Katyn massacre stored in the so-called. "special folder", including a copy of the resolution of the Political Bureau of the CPSU (b) of 5 March 1940 ordering the crimes of Polish prisoners of war and prisoners (so-called Katyn decision), and the so-called. Shel-epin notes. Author, inter alia, the academic synthesis of the history of the apparatus of power in the Soviet Union, the publication entitled 'Советский союз. История власти'. 1945-1991, 2000, 684 pp., published also in Poland.

Moderators:

Maria Przełomiec, a Polish journalist. She graduated from the Jagiellonian



University in Kraków. In the 1980-s she was involved in the underground journalism. In 1989 she cooperated with the *Tygodnik Powszechny* magazine. She is a former correspondent of the Polish section of the BBC and the Polish Public Television. She specializes in the subjects from the former Soviet Union countries and was one of the journalists who witnessed the collapse of the Soviet block. She published for such journals as *Dziennik*, *Przewodnik Katolicki*, as well as *Wprost*, *Kultura* or *Polityka* magazines. She is also an author or a co-author of numerous reports by the Center for Foreign Affairs. Since 2007 she hosts a TV program "Studio East" devoted to the latest issues in the post-soviet region.

Wiktór Ross, Polish political scientist, diplomat, Ambassador of Republic

of Moldova (1994-2000) and Armenia (2003-2004). Since 1991 works in diplomacy. For three years he served as counselor-minister and head of the political department at the Polish embassy in Moscow. In the years 1994-2000 he was a head of the Polish Embassy in Chisinau (since 1998 he was Dean of the Diplomatic Corps in Moldova). After coming back to Poland he worked as a counselor (2000) and deputy director (2001) of the Department of Strategy and Foreign Policy Planning Ministry of Foreign Affairs, then counselor and counselor-minister of the Department of Europe. He dealt with the issues of the Commonwealth of Independent States. From 2003 to 2004 he served as Ambassador of the Republic of Poland in Yerevan, and in 2005-2006 he was chargé d'affaires of the Polish Embassy in Russia.

Mykola Riabchuk, a cultural critic, editor, poet, and author of fiction, senior research fellow at the Ukrainian Centre for Cultural Studies and the Ukrainian intellectual journal - Krytyka, which is often compared to The New York Review of Books, permanent visiting professor at the Centre for East European Studies, University of Warsaw. He is a member of the Ukrainian PEN-club, has lectured

widely throughout Europe and the U.S., and is the winner of many awards, including the "The Book of the Year" award (Kyiv) for "Vid Malorosii do Ukrainy" (From Little Russia to Ukraine: Paradoxes of the Delayed Nation-Building. Kyiv, 2000), the Antonovych Prize in 2003 for outstanding achievements in the humanities and a Polish-Ukrainian Capitula Award in 2002 for his contribution to Polish-Ukrainian reconciliation. In 2011 he received a fellowship from the National Endowment for Democracy in Washington, D.C. Published several books concerning civil society, state and nation building, national identity, nationalism and post-communism transitions in Ukraine.

Markian Malskyy, Ukrainian geographer and political scientist, researcher of international relations lecturer in 2010-2014 Ambassador to Poland. In 1983 he received the title of candidate of geographical sciences, and then associate professor (1987), doctor of economic sciences (1995) and professor (1997). Since 1992, held the position of Dean of the Faculty of International Relations, Lviv National University. He was director of the эконкфь Baltic University, which was created in collaboration with the Swedish university in Uppsala. He taught at the Center for Security Policy in Geneva



(1998-2000), and during 1992-2002 he was Visiting Professor in the UK, Canada, Germany, Poland, the USA, Switzerland and Sweden.

Paweł Kowal, Polish politician and Member of the European Parliament for Poland Comes First (PJN). He is currently Chairman of the EU-Ukraine Parliamentary Cooperation Committee in the European Parliament. Paweł Kowal was elected to the Sejm in the 2005 election for Prawo i Sprawiedliwość, from the 12 – Chrzanów district. He won re-election in 2007. In 2009, he ran for the European Parliament in the Lesser Poland and Świętokrzyskie constituency, including Chrzanów. He came second amongst PiS candidates, behind Zbigniew Ziobro, taking the second Prawo i Sprawiedliwość seat won. He resigned his seat in the Sejm three days later. Paweł Kowal was elected in 2009 to European Parliament from the Krakow electoral district. Once in Parliament, Mr. Kowal joined the Group of European Conservatives and Reformists (ECR), serving as

Chairman of the parliamentary delegation to Ukraine.

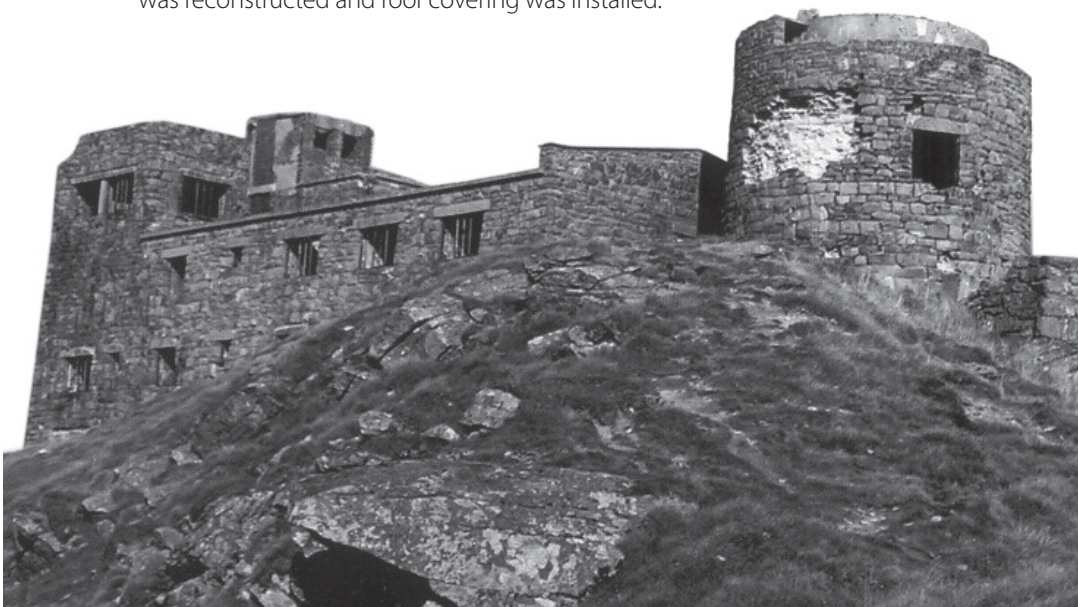

Renovation of the Pre-War University of Warsaw Meteorological Observatory on The Mount Pop Ivan - The Joint Polish-Ukrainian Project

In the year of 2013 the third stage of restoration of the pre-war observatory on the top of Pop Ivan in the Ukrainian Carpathians is going to be continued. With the financial support of Polish Ministry of Culture and National Heritage, a renovation design for the tower of the observatory will be prepared, and in the main body the staircase will be restored.

The project of restoration of the Observatory is part of the broader concept for the creation of the International Youth Academic Meeting Center in the Ukrainian Carpathians, which since 2007 it is held under the patronage the presidents of the two countries. The initiators and executors of these ambitious ideas include University of Warsaw and Precarpathian National University named by Vasyl Stefanyk.

Last year, thanks to a grant from the Ministry of Culture and National Heritage of Poland and Ukrainian partners, the main body of the building most of the windows and door openings were secured. Also most importantly, roof structure was reconstructed and roof covering was installed.

Kazimierz Wóycicki, Polish historian and journalist. In the communist times, he cooperated with democratic opposition circles and was an editor and publicist in underground press and an active member of the Club of Catholic Intelligentsia (KIK). He was the director of the Polish Institute in Düsseldorf and Leipzig in 1996-1999 and 2002-2005. He was the director of Szczecin branch of the Institute of National Remembrance. He teaches at the Centre for East European Studies at the University of Warsaw. His scientific interests and publications are concentrated on Central Europe and Germany.

Adam Balcer, is Programme Director "The EU and the new global contract" at demosEUROPA - Centre for European Strategy. He graduated from the Centre for East European Studies (M.A) and in the

Institute of Ethnology and Cultural Anthropology, the University of Warsaw. Currently, he is a Ph.D. candidate and lecturer at the Centre for East European Studies, the University of Warsaw. He was an expert at the Department of Central Europe (Balkan section) and Project Leader "Turkey after the launch of EU accession negotiations - foreign policy and internal affairs" at the Centre for Eastern Studies, Warsaw. In the years 2010-2012 he was a member of task force in the National Security Council of the President of Poland. In the years 2010-2011 he was an adviser to Marek Siwiec, MP at the European Parliament (the Eastern Partnership). Since 2010 he has been a member of the Advisory Group to the Committee of Foreign Relations at the Polish Parliament. He published numerous articles and reports on Balkans, Turkey, the CIS and the Black Sea.

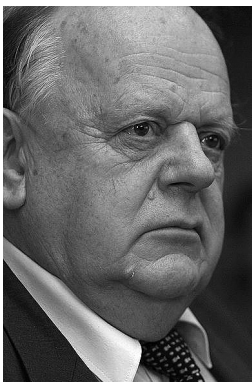

Belarusian politician and scientist. In the early 1960s, he was in charge of teaching Lee Harvey Oswald Russian when Oswald lived in Minsk. From September 28, 1991 to January 26, 1994 he was the first leader and head of state of independent Belarus after the dissolution of the Soviet Union (Chairman of the Supreme Soviet - also chairman of Parliament). He supported free market and democratic reforms and played a key role in the creation of the Commonwealth of Independent States.

As a scientist, he was Corresponding Member of the Belarusian Academy of Sciences, Doctor in Physics and Mathematics, recipient of various state awards, professor, and the author and originator of textbooks and over 150 articles and 50 inventions.

On December 8, 1991, in Belavezhsкая Pushcha and together with the leaders of Russia (Boris Yeltsin) and Ukraine (Leonid

Kravchuk), he signed a declaration that the Soviet Union was dissolved and replaced by the Commonwealth of Independent States; the declaration later became known as the "Belavezha Accords".

Shushkevich withdrew from Belarus the vestigial Soviet nuclear arsenal (both tactical and strategic), without preconditions or compensation from Russia or the West. However, other reforms became stalled due to the opposition from a hostile parliament as well as from Prime Minister Vyacheslav Kebich.

In late 1993, Alexander Lukashenko, the then-chairman of the anti-corruption committee of the Belarusian parliament, accused 70 senior government officials, including Shushkevich, of corruption, including stealing state funds for personal purposes. Lukashenko's accusations forced a vote of confidence, which Shushkevich lost. Shush-

kevich was replaced by Vyacheslav Kuznetsov and later by Myechyslau Hryb.

Further investigation revealed that the accusations against Shushkevich were without merit. In July, 1994 the first direct presidential elections were held in Belarus. Six candidates stood, including Lukashenko, Shushkevich and Kebich, with the latter regarded as the clear favorite. In the first round Lukashenko won 45% of the vote against 17% for Kebich, 13% for Paznyak and 10% for Shushkevich.

In 2002 the world learned about a highly unusual court case. Shushkevich sued the

Belarusian Ministry of Labor and Social Security: due to inflation, his retirement pension as a former head of state was the equivalent of US\$1.80 monthly.[2][3] To earn income, Shushkevich lectures extensively in foreign universities including in Poland, the United States and Asian countries.

In 2004 he attempted to participate in parliamentary elections, but was refused registration by the electoral commission.

He continues to be active in politics, heading the Belarusian Social Democratic Assembly party.
